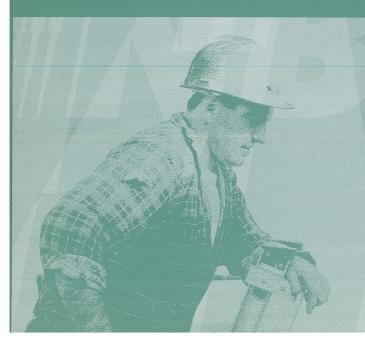

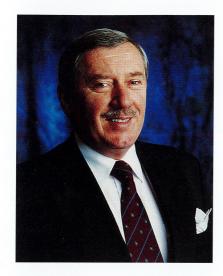

Chairman's Message to Shareholders



n behalf of the Board of Directors I am pleased to present to you the 15th Annual Report of your Company.

The success of the Company in its core business of property investment and development, is once again reflected in the result for the year ended 30 June1999 amounting to a profit of \$5,043,112 before tax.

Your Company has furthermore now established itself as a leader in style, quality and price in its chosen market segment. This is clearly indicated by the fact that most of the Company's current construction work in progress is on fully sold projects.

The decision in the previous year, to refocus on the Company's core business, has enabled it to invest in several significant development projects. This has enabled it to realise once again a profit, which is a good return on investment and, in excess of a 48% increase over the previous financial year.

At the same time, revenue projections on current projects are good and the Directors are confident of the future profitability of the Company.

The continuing success of the Company is anticipated on the basis of its current sound financial position and the diligent application of best practices in management and in policy setting. The Company's resources will continue to be directed towards the achievement of a persistently good level of profitability and net asset growth.

Once again, the payment of a dividend has been proposed by the Board of Directors, for which approval will be sought at the Shareholders' Meeting. A provision amounting to \$1,829,045 is included in the Annual Accounts.

The continued support of Shareholders is a key element in the success of your Company, for which the Directors again express their appreciation. Additionally, I must commend the Executive Directors and their staff for their dedicated efforts. As Chairman and one of three Non-Executive Directors, I also thank them for their support.

The Directors remain optimistic as to your Company's future and confident that your investment is sound.

You are invited to attend the Annual General Meeting of the Shareholders of your Company and a notice of meeting is enclosed with this Annual Report.

Managing Director's Review

he 1998/99 financial year has been an extremely rewarding one for your Company, with increased growth in assets, turnover, profit and earnings per share.

While recent years have focused on building the Company's market profile and property portfolio, 1998/99 has seen much of this hard work come to successful fruition.

Finbar is now recognised as one of Western Australia's foremost property development companies, achieving significant recognition for its success and expertise in the property market.

The Company's medium density residential projects are now amongst the finest in the state. Other industry players are increasingly keen to tap into the intellectual knowledge base and experience that the Company has developed.

Financially we have achieved a substantial 48 percent increase after tax profit to reach \$3.3 million.

Option conversions have brought in additional capital and will allow the Company to grow to the next phase providing the opportunity to source and secure land bank projects. This will in turn assist in securing the long term profitability of your Company.

The challenge for the Company now is to continue focussing on the development of high quality, medium-to-high density residential projects and specialised, high-return commercial properties. The majority of operation and project construction functions will continue to be outsourced on a performance-based arrangement. This will ensure that the Company maintains a lean corporate infrastructure, tasks are carried out efficiently and those involved remain motivated to produce and perform.

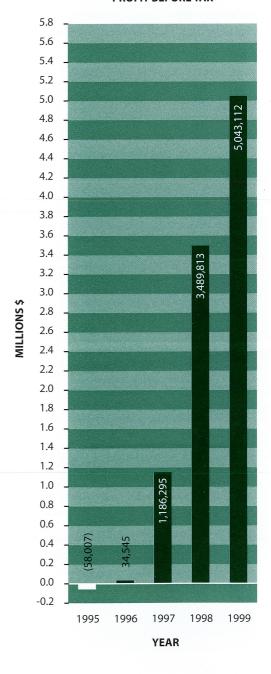
The success of Wellington Place stages one and two has proven the pent-up demand for wellpriced quality product. The Company will actively seek comparable sites for future projects.

Managing Director's Review

PROJECT STATUS SUMMARY

"The Gateway" and "Bluewater Apartments" - corner of Judd Street and Labouchere Road, South Perth.

The combined Gateway and Bluewater Apartment developments adjacent to the Kwinana Freeway on/off ramp will be the most significant combined residential and commercial project ever undertaken in South Perth.

Your Company acquired the land in October 1997 and recently received approval from the Minister for Planning to approve the zoning to allow for a substantial complex to be constructed on site. Submissions are now being presented to local council for planning permission of a \$25 million development that we hope to be able to commence construction of late in 1999.

The Gateway will be a 1,400m², three level commercial complex, featuring offices, retail outlets and café/restaurant.

Preliminary designs of Bluewater Apartments comprise 57 one, two and three-bedroom apartments, each with sweeping City and Swan River views and access to private landscaped gardens, pool, gymnasium, sauna and games area.

10 Kings Park Avenue, Crawley "Matilda Bay Apartments"

The Matilda Bay Apartments are due to be completed in September 1999. The complex comprises 12 fully appointed luxury apartments of which Finbar is able to realise nine sales (all sold), the balance being transferred to the original proprietors on completion as payment for the land.

Occupying an elevated site, Matilda Bay Apartments offer fabulous views over Kings Park and the magnificent Swan River. The property adjoins Kings Park and with access to nearby main roads it provides the opportunity to utilise the City facilities, theatres, cinemas, shopping, restaurants and nightspots whilst in close proximity to the University of Western Australia and yacht clubs.

These apartments, which encompass an entire floor each, have four large private balconies that are architecturally designed to take full advantage of the panoramic views of Matilda Bay, Kings Park and the Swan River to Mosman Park. Each design provides three double bedrooms with their own ensuite bathroom and generous walk-in robes. Other features include spa, master ensuite and audiovisual security.

All nine of the Matilda Bay Apartments have been sold providing a substantial contribution to the profit to 30 June 1999.

"Wellington Place" and "The Rise"

Wellington Place stage one "Wellington Place" and Wellington Place stage two "The Rise" were the outstanding success stories of Perth's inner city residential marketplace in 1998/99.

Stage one saw all 76 apartments sold within weeks of release, while stage two has sold more than half of its 68 apartments.

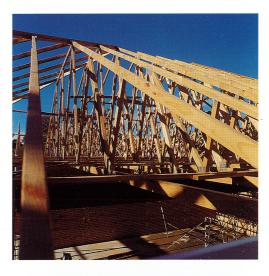
With both stages now under construction and with the help of some revolutionary construction methods, we estimate that completion of stage one will be March 1999 and stage two following in May 1999.

"Paddington Place" - Fitzgerald Street, West Perth

All of the 78 two and three-bedroom apartments in this landmark project are now sold, with many resales already showing strong growth for those who invested in this development. Paddington Place set a new standard for lifestyle-based inner city residential development in Perth.

167 Melville Parade, Como and 317 Canning Hwy, Como

Both of these luxurious residential developments are now complete and only one unit at 317 Canning Hwy, Como still remains to be sold. The Melville Parade project featured five luxury two storey townhouses with panoramic views of the Swan River, while the Canning Highway project has seven modest three bedroom two bathroom villas and townhouses.



Corfield Street Medical Centre in Gosnells and Albany Highway Medical Centre in Victoria Park

Both of these high profile medical facilities are now under construction and already fully leased. They are set to provide long-term rental income and capital appreciation.

The Gosnells facility covers 1,105m² and combines a pharmacy outlet with radiology, pathology, dentistry and physiotherapy practices. It will include 11 general practice consulting rooms and a large reception and waiting room area.

The 1,840m² Centre in Victoria Park includes 12 consulting rooms and an expansive waiting room. The development also incorporates 710m² of second floor offices and is situated in a prime location on Albany Highway.

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Corporate Governance Statement

This statement outlines the main Corporate Governance practices that were in place throughout the financial year unless otherwise stated.

Board of Directors

The Board is responsible for the Corporate Governance of the economic entity including its strategic direction establishing goals for management and monitoring achievement of these goals. The Company is not currently considered to be of a size, nor are its affairs of such complexity to justify the establishment of separate committees. Accordingly all matters which may be capable of delegation to a committee are dealt with by the full Board.

The Board meets regularly in order to retain control over the Company and to monitor the executive management. The Board has established a framework for the management of the Company including a system of internal control, a business risk management process and the establishment of appropriate ethical standards.

Each director has the right to seek independent professional advice at the Company's expense on matters relating to his position as a director of the Company, subject to obtaining prior approval of the Chairman which shall not reasonably be withheld.

Composition of the Board

The procedures for election and retirement of directors are governed by the Company's constitution and the Listing Rules of Australian Stock Exchange Limited.

The composition of the Board is determined using the following principles:

- The Board shall comprise directors with a range of expertise encompassing the current and proposed activities of the Company.
- Where a vacancy is considered to exist, the Board selects an appropriate candidate through consultation with external parties and consideration of the needs of shareholders and the Company. Such appointments are referred to shareholders at the next opportunity for re-election in general meeting.

Auditors

Whilst the Company does not have a formally constituted audit committee, the Board reviews the performance of the external auditors on an annual basis and a representative of the board meets with them at least twice a year to review:

- The results and findings of the audit, the adequacy of accounting and financial controls, and to obtain feedback on the implementation of recommendations made.
- The draft financial statements and audit/review reports at year end and half-year.

The Board monitors the need to form an audit committee on a periodic basis.

Internal Control Framework

The Board acknowledges that it is responsible for the overall internal control framework, but recognises that no cost effective internal control system will preclude all errors and irregularities. To assist in discharging this responsibility, the Board has instigated an internal control framework that can be described as follows:

Financial Reporting

■ There is a comprehensive budgeting system with an annual budget approved by directors. Monthly results are reported against budget and revised forecasts for the year are prepared and presented to the Board regularly. The Company reports to shareholders yearly. Procedures are in place to ensure price sensitive information is reported to ASX in accordance with Continuous Disclosure Requirements.

Quality and Integrity of Personnel

■ The Company conducts a review of the ability and experience of potential employees prior to appointment. Informal appraisals are conducted regularly with continuous feedback and on the job monitoring and training for employees.

Ethical Standards

The Company recognises the need for directors and employees to observe the highest standard of behaviour and business ethics in conducting its business.

Related Party Transactions

A review is undertaken at year end of all related party transactions.

Business Risks

The Board adopts practices designed to identify significant areas of business risk and to effectively manage those risks in accordance with the Company's risk profile.

Where necessary, the Board draws on the expertise of appropriate external consultants to assist in dealing with or mitigating risk.

Role of Shareholders

The Board of Directors ensures that shareholders in all jurisdictions are informed of all major developments affecting the Company's state of affairs.

Millennium Issue

Steps were taken by the Company during the year to identify and alleviate the likely impact of Year 2000 on business processes. The Year 2000 issue, however, is unique. There can be no assurance that the steps taken by any Company will successfully minimise vulnerabilities of its software and systems, or those of its suppliers, to the problems associated with the transition to the Year 2000. Significant third parties with which the Company interfaces include, among others, customers and business partners, technology suppliers and service providers, and the utility infrastructure (power, transportation, telecommunications), on which all entities rely. Lack of readiness by these third parties would expose the Company to the potential for loss, impairment of business processes and activities, and general disruption of its markets.

At 30 June 1999 the Company had expended \$21,000 on the Year 2000 project for consultants and computer hardware replacement. Computer replacement costs have been capitalised and all other costs expensed.

The Directors herewith present the financial report of Finbar International Limited ("the Company") and the auditors' report thereon.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The principal activities of the Company during the course of the financial year continue to be property investment and development.

The Company's focus is in the development of medium to high-density residential and specialised commercial buildings in the Perth metropolitan area.

There were no significant changes in the nature of the activities of the Company during the year.

RESULTS

The net profit after income tax amounted to \$3,317,254 (1998:\$2,233,432).

REVIEW OF OPERATIONS

During the year the Company commenced development works on five major projects. Three being residential developments with substantial sales achieved and two being commercial properties that are now fully leased.

The Company has funded its operations from its investments and cash reserves along with short-term construction finance that is project specific.

DIVIDENDS

The Company paid a final dividend of \$0.03 per fully paid ordinary share out of profits for the year ended 30 June 1998 during the year which amounted to \$1,619,826.

The Directors recommend the payment of a fully franked dividend of \$0.03 per fully paid ordinary share for approval by members at the company's annual general meeting with the entitlement date being post 31 August 1999.

The dividend recommended by the Directors amounts to \$1,725,221 for shares issued at 30 June 1999. As the entitlement date is post 31 August 1999, holders of options with a 31 August 1999 expiry date will, if exercised, be eligible for the dividend. Should all option holders exercise their options to ordinary shares, this would give rise to an additional dividend payment of \$1,208,569 not provided for in the financial statements.

SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN STATE OF AFFAIRS

There has been no significant change in the Company's state of affairs other than the changes in financial position disclosed in this report.

EVENTS SUBSEQUENT TO BALANCE DATE

There has not arisen in the interval between the end of the financial year and the date of this report any item, transaction or event of a material and unusual nature likely, in the opinion of the Directors of the Company, to affect significantly the operations of the Company, the results of those operations, or the state of affairs of the Company, in future financial years.

LIKELY DEVELOPMENTS

The Company will continue planned development projects on existing land and will seek new opportunities for the acquisition of development projects. Further information about likely developments in the operations of the Company and the expected results of those operations in future years has not been included in this report because disclosure of the information would be likely to result in unreasonable prejudice to the Company.

Paul Anthony Rengel (appointed 22/5/92)

Mr Rengel has a Bachelor of Commerce degree from the University of Western Australia. He is a Fellow of the Australian Institute of Chartered Accountants with 29 years' experience in public practice in international firms. Mr Rengel is a Partner in Moore Stephens BG, Chartered Accountants. He is an associate of the Australian Institute of Company Directors and the Australian Institute of Management. As Chairman he attended five of the five Directors' meetings and one shareholders' meeting held during the fiscal year.

John Chan (appointed 27/4/95)

Mr Chan has a Bachelor of Science degree from Monash University and Master of Business Administration degree from the University of Queensland. He has considerable experience as a Director in public corporations and in the areas of trading, manufacturing, finance and property development. Mr Chan attended five of the five Directors' meetings and two shareholders' meeting held during the fiscal year.

John Boon Heng Cheak (appointed 28/4/93)

Mr Cheak has a Bachelor of Economics degree from the University of Western Australia. He is an Executive Director of Chuan Hup Holdings Limited, a substantial shareholder in the Company. Mr Cheak attended none of the five Directors' meetings held during the year. It should be noted that Mr Cheak was in contact with the managing director on a regular basis throughout the year.

Richard Dean Rimington (appointed 27/4/95)

Mr Rimington is a property developer with 14 years experience in land subdivision, development, construction and marketing, with particular focus on high quality medium density residential property, which is the core business of the Company. He is responsible for project management of the Company's property development operations. Mr Rimington attended five of the five Directors' meetings and two shareholders' meeting held during the fiscal year.

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The significant policies which have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report are:

(a) Basis of Preparation

The financial report is a general purpose financial report which has been prepared in accordance with Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group Consensus Views, other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Corporations Law.

It has also been prepared on the basis of historical costs and, except where stated, does not take into account changing money values or current valuations of non-current assets. These accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated. Where necessary, comparative information has been reclassified to achieve consistency in disclosure with current financial year amounts and other disclosures.

(b) Revenue Recognition

Interest Income

Interest income is recognised as it accrues.

Asset Sales

The gross proceeds of asset sales are included as revenue. The profit or loss on disposal of assets is brought to account at the date of sale.

(c) **Borrowing Costs**

Borrowing costs include interest, amortisation of discounts or premiums relating to borrowings, amortisation of ancillary costs incurred in connection with arrangement of borrowings and lease finance charges. Borrowing costs are expensed as incurred unless they relate to qualifying assets. Qualifying assets are assets which take more than 12 months to get ready for their intended use or sale. Where funds are borrowed specifically for the acquisition, construction or production of a qualifying asset, the amount of borrowing costs capitalised is those incurred in relation to that borrowing, net of any interest earned on those borrowings. Where funds are borrowed generally, borrowing costs are capitalised using a weighted average capitalisation rate.

(d) Investments

Investment properties are carried at cost.

(e) Property, Plant and Equipment

Items of property, plant and equipment are initially recorded at cost then depreciated as outlined below.

Revaluations

Land and buildings are valued every three years on an existing use basis of valuation.

A provision for capital gains tax is only provided when it is known that the asset will eventually be sold. This provision, when required, is made against the asset revaluation reserve.

Items of property, plant and equipment, including buildings, but excluding freehold land, are depreciated, amortised using the straight line method over their estimated useful lives.

The depreciation rates used for each class of asset are

Buildings

4%

Plant and equipment

20%-40%

Assets are depreciated or amortised from the date of acquisition.

(f) Non-current Assets

The carrying amounts of non-current assets are reviewed to determine whether they are in excess of their recoverable amount at balance date. If the carrying amount of a non-current asset exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is written down to the lower amount.

In assessing recoverable amounts of non-current assets, the relevant cash flows have not been discounted to their present value, except where specifically stated.

Certain non-current assets have not been revalued. Valuations are performed on a three year basis in accordance with company policy.

(g) Income Tax

The company adopts the liability method of tax effect accounting. Income tax expense is calculated on operating profit after permanent differences between taxable and accounting income. Income tax on timing differences, which arise from items being brought to account in different periods for income tax and accounting purposes, is carried forward in the balance sheet as a future income tax benefit or a provision for deferred income tax. Future income tax benefits are not brought to account unless realisation of the asset is assured beyond reasonable doubt. Future income tax benefits relating to tax losses are only brought to account when their realisation is virtually certain.

(h) Inventories

Inventories are carried at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Land Held for Development

Land held for development and resale is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost includes the cost of acquisition, development, interest on funds borrowed for the development and holding costs until completion of development. Interest and holding charges incurred after development are expensed.

(i) Construction Work in Progress

Valuation

Construction work in progress is carried at cost plus profit recognised to date based on the value of work completed, less provision for foreseeable losses, allocated between amounts due from customers and amounts due to customers. Provision for the total loss on a contract is made as soon as the loss is identified.

Cost includes both variable and fixed costs directly related to specific contracts, and those which can be attributed to contract activity in general and which can be allocated to specific contracts on a reasonable basis.

Where the outcome of a contract cannot be reliably estimated, contract costs are expensed as incurred. Where it is probable that the costs will be recovered, revenue is only recognised to the extent of costs incurred.

Recognition of Profit

Profit is recognised on an individual contract basis using the percentage of completion method when the stage of contract completion can be reliably determined, costs to date can be clearly identified, and the following can be reliably estimated:

- total contract revenues to be received
- costs to complete

Profit recognition does not normally commence until a contract is at least 30% complete.

Stage of completion is measured by reference to an assessment of construction costs to date as a percentage of estimated total costs for each contract.

Development Work in Progress

Development work in progress is carried at cost, less any provision for anticipated future losses. Cost includes both variable and fixed costs relating to specific contracts, and those costs that are attributable to the contract activity in general and that can be allocated on a reasonable basis.

(j) Employee Entitlements

The company only has four full time employees and provision for their entitlements is made on the basis of the company's actual liabilities to balance date, measured at their actual amount and classified in terms of the current component payable within one year and the non-current component, payable later than one year. The amounts payable later than one year are not significant and the nominal value is not sufficiently different from present value to warrant recomputation

Contributions are made to employee superannuation funds in accordance with prescribed rules and are charged as expenses when incurred.

(k) Receivables

Trade Debtors

Trade debtors to be settled within 60 days are carried at amounts due. The collectibility of debts is assessed at balance date and specific provision is made for any doubtful accounts.

(I) Accounts Payable

Liabilities are recognised for amounts to be paid in the future for goods or services received, whether or not billed to the company. Trade accounts payable are normally settled within 60 days.

(m) Bank Loans

Bank loans are carried on the balance sheet at their principal amount subject to set-off arrangements. Interest expense is accrued at the contracted rate and included in "other creditors and accruals".

(n) Comparative Figures

Where necessary, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation in the current year.
